With press from such notable publications as BILLBOARD magazine, U.S. NEWS & WORLD REPORT and PLAYBOY as well as making their national television debut on the short-lived Fox Television program, "What's So Funny?", the band quickly won national notoriety.

Born and raised in Nappanee, Indiana, the band is a "no power trio" featuring the talents of *Carl Goodman*, *Barry Goodman* and *Graeber Goodman* (no relation) and relying on the electrical power generated by local windmills. The guys met at a Barn Raising and, because of a mutual love of music, formed a Skiffle group. Later, upon learning that Skiffle had gone out of fashion nearly forty years earlier, the band turned to Rock and Roll.

So don't wait until **The Electric Amish** are playing only stadiums to catch these bearded wonders. Grab a CD, pop it in and crank it up...if you're not afraid of *burning in Hell!* Tune in, churn on and grow a beard.
