

DEAR FRIENDS



I'm so proud to share that our HSHC team hustled every day to give every Hamilton County animal, and hundreds of Marion County's displaced animals, a chance to live, love and be loved. This has been incredibly difficult as we've struggled to find the space for daily arrivals, while also dealing with a decrease in dog adoptions. Less adoptions means that dogs are waiting longer for homes. The result is an increase in both our cost of daily care, as well as the staffing needed to provide it. These are all symptoms, however, of a greater problem.

HSHC AND COMMUNITIES ALL OVER THE U.S. ARE SEEING A STAGGERING INCREASE IN STRAY DOGS—AND THE REASON IS NOT WHAT YOU PROBABLY THINK.

Most metropolitan areas have seen the number of unwanted, abandoned and dogs born on the streets reach crisis levels since 2020. Many think this was caused by COVID—but in reality—COVID was just a convenient opportunity to implement something called "managed intake." Managed intake policies, by definition, are used to help prevent pet owners from surrendering their pets to a shelter, or, manage the timing of when they are surrendered to the shelter. This allows the shelter to set an appointment for when the animal will arrive, thereby ensuring a space is available.

Some national groups began promoting a new version of "managed intake" in 2019, and it really took hold in 2020. These redefined managed intake policies were designed to increase a shelter's live release rate to 90%, which by the same groups' definition, makes a shelter "no kill." So how do you do that with an open admission, municipal shelter that is already in crisis? **You**

manage down intake. You implement policies that divert stray animals from ever entering the shelter. For example, good Samaritans are required to make an appointment to bring in a stray dog or cat they've found. Since those appointments are often 4 to 5 weeks out (which has been the case with IACS/Marion County since 2021), the finder is typically forced to find another solution.



THE IMPACT IS REAL.

Marion County residents who have found a stray dog come to us every day for help. With no immediate options in Indianapolis, these folks are desperate. Sometimes they beg, sometimes they cry, and sometimes they get angry and abandon the dog in our parking lot or lobby. I can assure you that it's **always** hard for our team to say no. It's a heartbreaking situation and unfair burden that our team manages with grace and compassion. We take the ones at the greatest risk of hypothermia, starvation, and lifethreatening injuries. We do our best.

IN SPITE OF THE CHALLENGES, HSHC'S TEAM ROSE TO THE OCCASION, BREAKING FUNDRAISING RECORDS AND WINNING ACCOLADES IN 2024.

- Thanks to you, all three of our major fundraising events set records for both attendance and net dollars raised.
- Our volunteer program has reached 985 active volunteers who served over 78,000 hours in 2024.
- Our Pets Healing Vets program supported over 40 Veterans suffering from Post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) or traumatic brain injury (TBI).
- Our Pets Healing Vets program continues to be the only veteran-emotional support matching program we have found in the country that will cover 100% of pet expense for the life of the pet if needed.
- Our Youth Education & Scout programs reached 534 Hamilton County children.
- Our collaboration with Hamilton County Youth Assistance and Paws & Think continues to help build confidence in at-risk youth by making shelter dogs more adoptable with basic training.
- Our collaboration with Good Samaritan of Hamilton County stocks their pet food pantry each year, with additional food and supplies donated to Community Cats of Hamilton County.
- In January 2025, we received the Lantern Award as Westfield's most Outstanding Service Organization of the Year.

We are facing the same capacity challenges this year. I see no end in sight as Marion County's managed intake policies are still in place as of now. Still, it is impossible to not be fueled and inspired by the passion our team brings into this building each day. The support of our Board of Directors and Advisory Council is unwavering. Our volunteers are incredible beyond words. When you take all of that, plus you...all things are possible.

PURPOSE

HSHC's mission is saving lives, educating communities, and completing families. When it comes to saving lives, we take in nearly 4,000 animals annually including more than 500 at risk for euthanasia in other Indiana shelters.

Our community outreach programs connect children, seniors, Hoosier veterans, and more with the healing power of pets every day. Our youth education programs are planting the seeds of kindness, responsibility, and philanthropy in hundreds of children each year.

HSHC's advocacy for animals reaches far beyond Hamilton County as we have taken a leadership role in fighting breed discrimination and for better laws to protect animals. In collaboration with the Hamilton County Sheriff's Department, HSHC led the development of a best practice animal ordinance that defines adequate shelter and care and has been adopted by every city in Hamilton County.

The commitment to our mission doesn't stop with Hamilton County. We've always shared available resources to save as many out-of-county animals as possible.



PHILOSOPHY

For the past two decades, we have stayed true to the philosophy of being truly no-kill—a commitment that goes beyond arbitrary statistics. Our definition of no-kill means saving 100% of the animals in our care who are treatable or rehabilitatable, regardless of age, breed, medical conditions, or disabilities. We take in the hardest-to-save animals imaginable—those who others might deem unadoptable or too difficult to save. This journey has taken years of dedication, strategic planning, and immense effort. Since 2014, we have consistently maintained a live placement rate of 98% or higher, and in 2024, we achieved a 97.7% live release rate while caring for nearly 4,000 animals. This success is a testament to our commitment to doing Whatever It Takes.

Our no-kill philosophy is not just a goal; it's the foundation of our mission to give every animal the chance to live, love, and be loved. Achieving this requires sacrifice, dedication, and a relentless focus on fundraising, marketing, and adoption programs. It also demands collaboration with local rescues and shelters to ensure we can provide the best possible care to each animal that comes through our doors. From our early days in a high-kill shelter with limited resources to the vibrant, life-saving organization we are today, we have remained steadfast in our mission. Your continued support is crucial in helping us stay true to our no-kill promise, and we are deeply grateful for your dedication to the animals we serve.


